MATLOCK AND BAKEWELL VOLUNTEER BUREAU

runs a small Volunteer Car Scheme from the Bureau which provides a vital service to people living in our area and the surrounding villages who have difficulty using public transport, particularly older people. The car scheme enables people to get to doctors' appointments, visit their dentists, make use of local services and stay in touch with relatives.

Of course any volunteer scheme is only as good as the volunteers or as extensive as the number of volunteers allows! Our Volunteer Car Scheme is no exception.

So if you have a car, time on your hands and wish to be of help

to others, then look no further. Any assistance and time that you can offer will be gratefully received.

We recognise that cars are an expensive investment and are costly to run and maintain so we do make a contribution toward these costs, currently set at 25p per mile.

We guarantee that you will never become financially rich through any involvement in the Volunteer Car Scheme but the rewards in terms of "job satisfaction" are high.

Everybody needs good Neighbours

Neighbourhood Watch began in 1982 when the residents of a Cheshire village agreed to keep an eye on each others' homes. The local police were very supportive and the number of burglaries substantially decreased.

Watch schemes throughout the country cover about 25% of the population. Youlgrave Watch started in 1992. About 125 households in the village are members increasing all the time. When we started we asked for a small contribution from each member to buy the signs. Now the scheme in Youlgrave is grateful for the financial support of Parish Council and a subscription is no longer required.

The police give Neighbourhood Watch every encouragement, passing details of local crime and other relevant information through a telephone tree, ensuring important information reaches all members as quickly as possible, as well as important groups such as the Women's Institute and the British Legion. The speed and efficiency of the system depends entirely on volunteers and we are anxious to recruit more co-ordinators to help the scheme operate.

We are warned when particular types of crime occur in the area, such as thefts from sheds, garages and motor vehicles. We are also encouraged to help the police. Our members are asked to report anything that they think is suspicious or worrying to the police or to their co-ordinator. The police want to know about anything that concerns us and do not consider any call to be a waste of their time. It is vital that information is passed to the police as quickly as possible, so that they can investigate without delay. Sixty percent of crime is never reported at all, which makes the work of the police very difficult.

Our scheme also produces a newsletter and arranges occasional events such as Crime Prevention evenings. We have Coffee Mornings from time to time attended by police officers when people can discuss any worries or problems they may have. Free door chains have been distributed to older people in the village and special notices to warn off uninvited callers. We sell tamper-proof tax disc holders for vehicles (70p. from Bridget Ardley or from the Post Office). We can arrange security marking of personal property.

If you are not already a member and would like to join Neighbourhood Watch, please contact Bridget Ardley (Area Coordinator) on 636611 or Bob Skinner (Deputy Area Co-ordinator) on 636324 and you will receive a Member's Pack. And please note again that we do need more co-ordinators, young or old. Fortunately we do not have much crime in the village, help us to keep it that way and being a co-ordinator would not take up much of your spare time.

Dear Bugle

I write on behalf of the Management Council of the Youlgrave Village Hall to express their concern about the article "Youlgrave Playgroup Under Threat" in the May edition. They are concerned that the writer queried whether the Village Hall Committee could "perhaps look on the playgroup's plight with more sympathy and offer some sort of financial assistance." The fact is that the Village Hall has done, and continues to do, just what has been suggested.

Although the Hall itself relies heavily on voluntary work and fund raising, here are just some examples of the help it has given to the Playgroup: -

- 1. The hiring charge, last reviewed in July 1994, is currently only £6 per morning. At a recent review of all hiring charges it was decided not to increase the charge for this or other similar organisations, simply because the Management Council are fully aware of the problems being met by such organisations.
- 2. All storage facilities for the Playgroup's equipment has always been provided free of charge.
- 3. In 1997, to provide a safe outside play area, the Village Hall provided and fitted the wooden frames for safety mesh required on four large windows. At the same time a wooden gate was made and fitted to make the area more secure. Provision of the materials and the work entailed was undertaken by the Village Hall at no cost whatsoever to the Playgroup.

The management Council trusts that the above information clearly demonstrates their long-standing sympathy with and support of the Youlgrave Playgroup.

The Joe Birds Memorial Plaque

Sunday 19th July saw the inaugural cricket match for the Joe Birds Memorial plaque.

Joe Birds, who died in January 1997, was a keen sportsman who played cricket for Youlgrave until the 1960's. His widow, Mavis, donated a sum of money to the cricket club in his memory and it was decided to dedicate a silver plaque, made by Asquith's, to be played for annually by the junior teams of Youlgrave and Elton.

In inclement weather, which brightened up eventually, an U14 XI from Youlgrave made 90 in their allotted 20 overs and Elton replied with 76. Mavis presented the plaque to Youlgrave Captain, Jonathan Wilson, and Joe's daughter and son, Gillian and Peter and their families watched the match. A raffle raised the sum of £22, which has been donated to club funds.

A friendly group of people from the Village and as far away as Sheffield meet on Wednesday afternoons to do all types of furniture restoration. Some of the items belong to group members while others are what people have bought at auction or something they are completing for friends.

We manage to cover most methods, including traditional upholstery and French polishing as well as caning, rushing and small repairs. Items do not have to be antique as we try to accommodate whatever anybody wants to do. We operate on a weekly basis so people come

when they can and pay £2.50 per week. We start at 1.30pm and continue for 2 hours or more with a tea break during the afternoon.




