We are all aware that rural businesses like shops and post offices are under threat, so Youlgrave should count itself lucky that it still has three pubs – especially when the likes of Winstar and Hartington have just two remaining, and a large village such as Eyam only one. So it's timely to take a look at what's new and innovative in our pubs for this Spring, and in so doing encourage everyone to support their local. Cheers!



The Bull's Head Hotel (tel. 636307)

The extensive renovations are now complete, and the changes are considerable. The new-look tap room, in particular, has been transformed. The original parquet floor has been uncovered and restored, stylish alcoves have been developed, and a new colour scheme introduced. A brand new kitchen has been installed, while the re-decorated lounge and dining room feature photos of local scenes taken by Mark and Sharon. A new departure from the popular main menu is a range of cooked-to-order pizzas, available late into the evening.

The George Hotel (tel. 636292)

The George Hotel has banned smoking from the main bar during eating hours – from 11am through to around 9pm. The extensive menu of home-cooked food is supplemented by its usual range of real ales, and the



George remains the only pub in the village to be listed in CAMRA's Good Beer Guide. The George is also the base for the Conskbury Golf Society, who are embarking on their new season this month.

The Farmyard Inn (tel. 636221)

On Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays, the Farmyard Inn will be open from 5pm, and between 5-6.30 the new T-Time Menu will offer the likes of steak & chips, sausage & mash, and stew & giant Yorkshire puddings for just £4. The main menu will of course be available at other food-serving times, including the hugely popular Sunday carvery and mouth-watering desserts. As reported in an earlier *Bugle*, the pub has recently been awarded the Cask Marque in recognition of its well-kept real ale.

Village Hall shows off new kitchen



The kitchen is used every week by the Monday Club, and here Shirley Brassington gets to grips with the dishwasher and Daphne Jackson is busy at the new sink unit.

Youlgrave Village Hall has a new, gleaming, black and white kitchen.

It is three years since we asked Derbyshire Dales District Council's Environmental Officer for unofficial advice: he made no less than fourteen recommendations. Last October, the *Bugle* reported that Waste Recycling Environmental Ltd had awarded a grant, part of which would help pay for a new kitchen. At last, we had the money to implement that advice, and the work is already finished.

We now have separate facilities to prepare cooked and uncooked food, two microwave cookers, an electric hot cupboard to supplement our gas oven, a commercial dishwasher and, of course, floor-to-ceiling cupboards. One of the worst faults of the kitchen had been its broken floor surface; the floor had been dug up, when, many years ago, a sunken central heating pipe corroded and needed repair. Now the kitchen has good quality non-slip linoleum. And we have laid a similar floor throughout the new Social Room, too.

Unfortunately, those troublesome and

unsightly central heating pipes remain for the present. But good news: next summer the whole of the central heating system will be updated.

Youlgrave badger found dead in snare

Researchers from York who had been radio-tracking a badger around the village since November last year, were forced to abandon their work here when on Friday 4 March they made a grim discovery. Someone had set a snare and the badger was dead.

This was the badger that last summer chose to dig himself a new sett in the graveyard to All Saints Church. Understandably, his activities in the graveyard caused considerable consternation among some local residents, especially when he began to dig out human bones. It was perhaps fortunate that the nearest headstone carried the date 1794, in this older part of the graveyard.

The vicar took appropriate action and this was when the badger group became involved. The law protects badgers and their setts, so a licence was applied for, under the 1992 Badgers Act. An official from Defra came from Leeds to assess the situation and the licence was granted. This enabled the badger group to begin a procedure of gating the badger out of his new sett, leaving him free to either return whence he came, or to find himself an alternative location, hopefully less contentious. The sett was subsequently filled in and closed.

Next he chose to dig in a nearby garden. Unfortunately once again a less than ideal location, so yet again a licence was obtained to exclude him.

Tracking his movements

When the vicar rang to ask if we could move him on from his garden a third licence was sought. It was then we learned of a research project, looking at the behaviour of urban and suburban badgers after licensed exclusions. It seemed the Youlgrave badger was an ideal candidate for study. The researchers came down to Derbyshire, the badger was caught, sedated and examined, found to be a male, in good bodily condition with no badger fight

wounds, he was then fitted with a radio collar.

The collar carried a device which would constantly emit a radio signal that could be detected by the researchers hand-held receiver. This allowed the badger's position to be found as he roamed freely around during the night, giving an insight into his behaviour. Tracking began on 1 November, and with the vicarage sett already closed the badger had taken to living in a stone culvert, alongside a nearby house.

Night-time movements

One night I accompanied one of the researchers tracking the badger as it moved back and forth in the moonlight around neighbouring gardens, not going very far, but simply mooching around looking for invertebrates to feed on. Regular monitoring continued up to Christmas and in January he was still in the culvert.

All came to an end on Friday 4 March. One of the researchers had been out radio tracking the night before, but the badger had remained in his culvert all night. Before returning to York in the morning, he made a final check and discovered the badger's fate. The police were called to investigate. The radio collar was missing from around the badger's neck, though still emitting a signal from somewhere close by.

What a dreadful shame that this animal should have been the victim of such a senseless act of extreme cruelty. The research team, having spent weeks tracking the badger had their work here ruined by an act of sheer bigotry.

Youlgrave Parish Council Chairman's Report

At last, this year the new toddler play area has been completed. It provides a safe range of activities vital to the development of our younger residents, all contained within a safety fence. A climbing tower and new safety surface are still outstanding for the 'junior' area and will require considerable finance for which we have to apply for grants. The playing field is being maintained and hopefully may see a couple of friendly cricket matches through the summer. The pavilion is always in need of maintenance and currently the main concern is the upgrading of the electrics which will cost several hundred pounds – watch out for fundraising events.

Major funded work on the Village Hall is now complete and has been viewed and admired by many of the villagers. A varied programme of activities for all the community are ongoing, and new activities for the young are in the pipeline. The Hall committee is now looking to the fruits of their various 'sales' to improve and re-light the main hall. And exciting heritage project that will protect and display various aspects of our village history is also in the offing.

The Music Fest of 2004 was a resounding success. The provisional dates for Youlgrave Fest 2005 are 9th, 10th and 11th September.

The new road surface was recently rolled out, and while there was some inconvenience, generally people were very patient. There are, however, a

couple of problems that need resolving regarding the line painting. The lined 'pavement' seems appreciated by those walking through the village, which is most encouraging.

The introduction of wheeled bins has caused some anger and concern this year. We sent a lengthy reply to DDDC giving our opinions on their proposals. We feel that many opportunities for recycling are lost, and information on what exactly can be recycled where and when is poor. Our offer of a site for recycled cardboard was ignored. The choice of container for compostable waste collection was inappropriate. We estimate that wheeled bins are out of the question for almost 40% of the village. Despite a visit to one of our meetings by Environmental Services, we felt scant consideration was given to our suggestions and grievances, and that the policy of the council had already been set.

New road surface dug up within fortnight

Contrary to predictions from some quarters, Youlgrave Waterworks Ltd. was not the first to dig up the new road surface, laid through the village in February and early March. That dubious honour fell to Transco, who on 21st March broke the pristine tarmac in order to investigate a gas leak at Coldwell End. According to local residents the smell of gas was reported before the re-surfacing at Coldwell End even took place!

Wilton Shagpile (1920-2005), Shakespearean actor-manager

The Bugle’s esteemed theatre critic, Wilton Shagpile, has sadly been curtain-called to the great stage in the sky. We offer this tribute to a remarkable and greatly-missed local character.

Wilton Shagpile (real name withheld) was born into a local Youlgrave family in 1920 as a result, according to Wilton himself, of a short liaison between his mother Nellie, at the time working as a dancer in the West End, and the actor and former test cricketer C. Aubrey ‘Round the Corner’ Smith. Smith was later knighted and became a Hollywood star and it is likely that he retained an interest in the prospects of his issue.

Wilton was educated at Youlgrave school and Lady Manners, Bakewell (paid for).

His theatrical career began with the Iola Players under Major Mockett and he somehow secured a place in Repertory in Stratford on Avon where he showed great promise, his name being linked with those of Mills, Attenborough and Miles.

Flat feet and short sight kept him from the Armed Forces but the war saw the start of his film career, albeit mainly in small supporting roles.

Who will forget his line in *In which we serve*: “Cuppa cocoa, Sir?” to which Noel Coward replied with great veritas: “Thanks, Snotty.”

His wartime film career was curiously linked with Coward and included appearances in *This Happy Breed* as a young man in a pub delivering: “There’ll never be another war. You mark my words!” with gusto; and the third Railway Guard in *Brief Encounter* giving us “All aboard that’s getting aboard”. (Look for Wilton in the up and coming showing of this by the Youlgrave Film Society.)

Post-war, Wilton’s career seemed on the point of taking off with cameo parts in Ealing Comedies and early 1950s war films, and he was a regular on the London Club scene; his name mentioned in the same breath as More,

Todd and Hawkins.

The big breakthrough however eluded him and the 1960s saw him working largely in television. You name it, he was in it: Maigret, Callan, Adam Adamant, The Prisoner (his number was 8) and Dr Who, playing a Silurian.

It was at the end of what he later called in his autobiography ‘My Wilderness Years’ that he realised, probably after seeing a production of *Hair*, that his future lay as a Shakespearean Actor-Manager introducing the Bard to the masses and at the same time getting to work with many young, up and coming not to say nubile actresses.

Amongst those who worked under him at this time were Dench, Smith and Scales and he regarded the 70’s as his ‘Great Decade’ in which he lived life to the full and influenced (for good or ill, I’m not sure) the careers of Hurt, Baker and Jacobi.

The subsequent years were not really kind to Wilton; he lost much of his money in damages and costs after a lawsuit in which he was sued

over a copyright matter by his great rival the impresario Chuffer Dandridge. He was forced to take parts in obscure pantomimes and end of pier shows and by his own admission he completely lost the 1980s when he was as he said ‘Afloat on the good ship Johnnie Walker’.

Moving back to Youlgrave in 1991 was his salvation. He dried out and was able to take bookings at local venues and review productions in local papers. I for one will never forget his soliloquy from *Hamlet* as he won the talent competition at the Burton Institute for the 1994 Winster Carnival.

He became a well loved ‘character’ retaining an eye for the ladies to the very end.

Wilton never married and is survived by a nephew to whom pass Wilton’s private papers. There may be revelations to come!

He will be sadly missed.

Recycling update

Don't forget that in the church we recycle silver paper, mobile phones, religious books, CDs/DVDs/CD ROMs, used computer cartridges, & postage stamps. The stamps make 1p each for the Leprosy Mission. Please remember to cut them neatly around the stamp and leave them in the Stamp Box on the recycling pew in the parish church.

The CDs/DVDs/CD ROMs collected are taken by Cath Stone (Holly Cottage) to Polymer Reprocessors on the Wirral. Although we do not make any money from them for charity, at least we will know we are helping with recycling and lessening the landfill problem.

I now have more information about the Computer ink cartridges: The firm concerned only accepts inkjet cartridges made by Hewlett Packard, Canon Bubblejet and IBM 4076. They do NOT accept Epson or other types of Canon. They do accept Laser cartridges of which they list over 2000 models! If possible, all used parts, plus the original packaging and boxes, need to be saved. The money raised will be put towards the Church Roof Appeal, so please do all you can to fill the container as often as possible.

Go wild in the garden!

The first celandines, daisies and dandelions are coming through and the roadside verges are sprouting fast with the feathery leaves of cow parsley. In shadier spots the green tassels of dog's mercury, broad spotted leaves of wild arum and the onion-scented spikes of wild garlic are showing. The first bees and butterflies are about. The garden can be an invaluable source of early nectar. There are many lovely woodland-type plants which flower before the rest of the vegetation appears. A planting of hellebores, pulmonaria and grape hyacinth will be invaluable to early insects and look lovely with small bulbs like crocus and miniature daffodils. Let us know of any interesting local wildlife sightings you have made, and I will include them in this column as space permits.

Wildlife project of the month



Making a pond is the single most useful thing that gardeners can do for wildlife. A sunny position is best, away from overhanging trees and fenced off if there is a danger to young children. Making use of existing hollows will give the pond a more natural look. Placing a pond next to an existing border is excellent as baby frogs can find safety when they emerge. Keep one side of the pond overgrown and inaccessible to feet to give pond wildlife a safe haven. More on this important topic next time.
