Youlgrave Youth Club got underway at the end of September, and despite a complete lack of funds it soon had generous donations of a CD player, table football, air hockey, a darts board and a table tennis table. Thanks to Barbara, Sally, the School and the Bull's Head.

There are presently 23 fully paid up members, ten enthusiastic volunteer leaders, a well-stocked refreshment bar, lots of noise and good-natured youngsters. ## POLICING CHANGES

She will be supported by PC Dave Rowbotham from Bakewell.

## STREET CLEANING

Youlgrave Parish Council has complained to Derbyshire Dales District Council over the frequency of street cleaning in the village, following persistent complaints about the high levels of litter. DDDC street cleaners currently visit Youlgrave four times a year, plus one extra clean before Welldressing, but the Parish Council believes that a busy village the size of Youlgrave should be serviced monthly.

## Brian Edwin Atkinson 1934-2005

At rest on 29th September 2005, Brian moved to Youlgrave 25 years ago to take over the Bulls Head where he was Landlord for 14 years. During his time there he made many changes. The Bulls Head was the first pub to have a no-smoking dining room. Brian organised a team of regulars who called themselves the 'Bulls Head Flying Squad', and over the years raised hundreds of pounds for various local good causes.

He could be found most Saturday lunchtime enjoying his favourite game of dominoes with his friends and regulars, and at closing time his saying "Come on you horrible lot, have you got no homes to go to?" will be long remembered.

# THE UNRETURNING ARMY

**Acclaimed show depicts the story of Derbyshire Dales and the Great War**

Cotton Grass Theatre will be giving a performance of their Remembrance Day show, *The Unreturning Army*, on the evening of Saturday 5 November in Youlgrave Village Hall. It's about the people of Youlgrave and other Peak villages between 1914-1918, and is told with reminiscences, songs and the poems of the Great War. It is about love, loss, patriotism and bravery. All proceeds from the performance will go to the Village Hall in order to provide new wings and black backdrops for the stage.

The pantomime is a long-established annual event, and in the last year the stage has seen three professional productions (by Cotton Grass and Yellow Leaf Theatre Companies) and one amateur show from the Holywell Players. We also eagerly await Tangere Arts' adaptation of DH Lawrence's *The Fox* (see page 7). So the Village Hall is developing fast as a theatre venue and the



stage desperately needs refurbishment. At some point a new floor will be needed.

We want to start to raise money for this, and so we hope that as many people as possible will come to see *The Unreturning Army*. The show attracted big audiences when it toured Derbyshire in 2003 and is a poignant account of life for Derbyshire Dales men and women in 1914. Come and listen to the stories, songs and poems of the Great War.

# The 'Fox' comes to Youlgrave

An exciting new play, *The Fox (and the Little Vixen)* by Stephen Lowe, produced in association with Derby Playhouse, is having its last night performance at Youlgrave Village Hall. The play has been on tour, mainly in the Midlands, and has attracted excellent notices as well as playing to full houses nearly everywhere.

Jill and Ellie move to the country looking for a quiet life running a small farm, only to discover that "You can't have free range chickens and a free range fox!"

A young soldier, Henry, returning from Iraq offers to help them, only to embark upon a dangerous game of deception and betrayal. It's a brooding tale of desire, death and survival that will have you captivated.

"Ingenious and satisfying and the performances from all are superb." (Derby Evening Telegraph).

"Lowe and his capable director, Maggie Ford, capture brilliantly the increasingly anguished game-play of this edgy sexual triangle. Tricia Donnison's set is a model of how to say much with little. The drama is gusty and explosive and Lawrence's original is grippingly revitalized." (The Stage)

Nottingham-based Stephen Lowe has an impressive track record as a playwright. His plays *Touched* and *The Ragged Trousers Philanthropist* were particularly successful. His most recent play *Old big 'Ead in the Spirit of the Man* has received national acclaim and will shortly be having a major tour.

This production of *The Fox* has a particularly local input with Maggie Ford from Bankside directing and Tricia Donnison from Stoneyside designing. Some of you may have seen Tricia covered in white dust as she was building 'stone walls' – on, of course, Stoneyside!

The play has some strong language and is not suitable for children. It also has two gunshots in the second half of the play. BUT if you enjoy a thriller, full of sexual tension, *The Fox* will prove an excellent evening at the theatre.

## GO WILD IN THE GARDEN

Late flowering perennials and shrubs are still supplying food for insects and birds. As well as giving excellent structure to the border, the large upright sedums are loved by insects and butterflies. Later they provide useful seedheads. Asters, buddleia and the 'Autumn Glory' hebe are also attractive in the wildlife border. Spring flowering bulbs like crocus, grape hyacinth, wild daffodil and winter aconite will be a food source for insects in the earliest part of the year if planted now.



## WILDLIFE PROJECT OF THE MONTH

We are very lucky to have some existing woodland areas in the Bankside Wildlife Garden which can be developed further with bird and bat boxes. The leaf litter beneath is great for insects and what nicer place to have informal seating in any season. Creating a mini-woodland from scratch is fun and very worthwhile. Trees can even be raised from seeds and cuttings. The end of the garden can make a peaceful haven with a few trees and rough grass beneath. If space permits, plant in three layers with large trees like beech and lime underplanted with medium trees like field maple and elder and then native shrubs beneath.

## Grants available for groups working with young people

The Local Network Fund is a government initiative from the Department of Education and Skills, and administered locally through the independent Derbyshire Community Foundation. The aim of the fund is to support new activities and projects for young people up to 19 years. You don't have to be a charity to apply, but the activity that you would like the money for needs to be something new (and you can't simply apply for running costs). Group projects that have been funded in the Dales area over recent years include setting up a new Rainbows group, running art workshops for young people and their families in a community centre and writing workshops for young people. Locally, the Foundation has already helped fund 1st Youlgrave Guides trip to Northern Ireland in 2004, and it's just been announced that they are to help fund Youlgrave's new Youth Club for its first year.
